Round 1: David Colin Joyce (aka Trotsky)

All questions or answers contain (1) David, (2) Colin, (3) Joyce and (4) Trotsky

- 1a:** Camp David, the country retreat of the President of the United States, was given this name by which president, in honour of his father and grandson? Dwight D **Eisenhower**
- 1b:** Who, in 1948, became the 1st Prime Minister of Israel? **David Ben-Gurion** (accept **David Grün**)
- 2a:** Name this British actor and screenwriter. He won the Academy Award for Best Original Screenplay for his script for *Chariots of Fire* (1981). Appeared in *Z Cars* and as a school teacher in *Kes*? **Colin Welland**
- 2b:** Name the British actor who played the 6th incarnation of Dr. Who? **Colin Baker**
- 3a:** The Irish American broadcaster, William Joyce (1906 –1946) was probably better known by the British public as whom? **Lord Haw-Haw**
- 3b:** Mike Joyce was the drummer for which 1980's alternative rock band. Their albums included "*Meat is Murder*" and "*Strangeways, Here We Come*"? **The Smiths**
- 4a:** Name the 1977 song by the Stranglers which refers to Leon Trotsky in these terms - "*he got an ice pick that made his ears burn*" **No More Heroes**
- 4b:** Leon Trotsky was assassinated in the suburbs of which city? **Mexico City**
- Spare:** In the BBC series *Blackadder III - Dish and Dishonesty*, name the rotten borough "*consisting of a tiny plot of land with several farm animals – 3 rather mangy cows, a Dachshund named Colin and a small hen in its late forties*"? **Dunney on the Wold**

These are questions on sport in 1962 and 2012 (no Olympics).

- 1a:** In 2012, which large annual sporting event, first held in 1970, was controversially cancelled on 2nd November due to Hurricane (or Super Storm) Sandy? **New York Marathon**
- 1b:** Which South American country hosted the 1962 FIFA World Cup Finals? **Chile**
- 2a:** Which North West team were beaten 3-1 by Tottenham Hotspur in the 1962 FA Cup Final? **Burnley**
- 2b:** In the 2012 French Open tennis tournament, which player won the men's singles title? Rafael **Nadal**
- 3a:** Name the Australian female tennis player who won 3 out of the 4 Grand Slam singles titles in 1962? In 1963, she became the 1st Australian woman to win the Wimbledon singles title. Margaret **Smith** (accept **Court**)
- 3b:** Which horse won the 2012 Cheltenham Gold Cup but was fatally injured in the 2012 Grand National? **Synchronised**

4a: Which colourful English golfer's pugnacious and uplifting performances in the 2012 Ryder Cup, scoring 4 out of 4 points, helped lift his team to a stunning comeback win over the USA?

- 2b: Who was born at Winchester in 1102, became heir to Henry I, only to be usurped? Her son became Henry II. **Matilda**
- 3a: "Sound II", which can be found in Winchester Cathedral's crypt, is the work of which modern British Sculptor? It comprises a life-sized lead statue of a man standing in differing levels of flood water. Antony **Gormley**
- 3b: Born in Southampton in June 1829, John Everett Millais was responsible for which painting that was to be later used for many years to advertise Pear's Soap? **Bubbles** (accept **A Child's World**)
- 4a: Name the castle on the Isle of Wight, where King Charles I was imprisoned from 1647 to 1648? **Carisbrooke** Castle
- 4b: James Callaghan was born in Portsmouth in 1912; he won his first seat in 1945 and would hold a seat in this non-Hampshire city continuously until 1987. Name the city. **Cardiff**

- 2a: Common in the UK, what is the small olive-brown warbler, similar to the Willow Warbler, which gets its name from its distinctive song? **Chiffchaff**
- 2b: Common in the UK, what is the medium-sized, cliff-nesting gull, which is named after its loud, nasal call? **Kittiwake**
- 3a: What is the object "2012 DA14" which has been in the news recently?
It is the **Asteroid** which passed close to Earth
