Red and White – All songs have red or white in the title. Name the song.

- 1a** Blues song recorded originally in 1961 by Howling Wolf later versions being recorded by The Doors and the Rolling Stones (1964). It is the only blues song which has reached number 1 in the British charts
A. Little Red Rooster
- 1b** Released as a single from this his 1983 album '1999', this was Prince's first top ten single about a night out with a very promiscuous woman.
A. Little Red Corvette
- 2a** Song about a man who drinks to forget his woes and is found on the street by his father who helps him up. Originally recorded by Neil Diamond but the UB40 version topped both the UK and US charts in 1968.
A. Red Red Wine
- 2b** The singer in this song will not give up on a failing relationship and is featured on an album by Dido – 'Life for Rent'
A. White Flag
- 3a** Written by Grace Slick whilst with the Great Society, she later recorded the song having joined Jefferson Airplane. It was allegedly the first song to sneak drug related lyrics past the censors.
A. White Rabbit
- 3b.** German song of 1983 being an anti war protest song and which became a big hit right across Europe reaching No 1 in the UK in 1984.
A. 99 Red Balloons
- 4a.** 1968 psychedelic rock song written by Jack Bruce and Pete Brown and reached No 26 in the UK charts.
A. White Room
- 4b** Song from 1982 by Billy Idol written to voice his displeasure at his sister's fiancé who impregnated her before their marriage.
A. White Wedding
- Spare** Song written by Justin Hayward after his girlfriend gave him a gift of some bedlinen.
