1B The second largest French speaking city in the world. **MONTREAL**

2A A major Scandinavian city, located on the Gulf of Finland facing Tallinn. **HELSINKI**

2B In which city is the Gateway Arch? At 630 feet it is the tallest man-made monument in the Western Hemisphere. **ST LOUIS**

3A Which city was the first European Capital of Culture in 1985. **ATHENS**

3B The city of birth of Vanessa Feltz, Joe Calzaghe, Bob Hope and Daniel Day-Lewis. **LONDON**

4A This city boasts the world's busiest airport and the world's largest aquarium. **ATLANTA**

4B This northern European port located on the estuary of the River Scheldt claims to be the diamond trading centre of the world. **ANTWERP**

ROUND 7 – Book titles that contain a girl's/woman's name

1A This book published in 2006 and written by Douglas Coupland tells the story of Liz a self-described drab, overweight, crabby and friendless middle-aged woman. Its title is shared by a Beatles composition released in 1966 on Revolver album and as a single.

ELEANOR RIGBY

1B This novel by Virginia Woolf was first published in 1925. The glittering wife of an MP she is preparing for a grand party that evening but her thoughts are in the past as she remembers the time when she was as young as her own daughter Elizabeth.

MRS DALLOWAY

2A This novel by Daniel Defoe was first published in 1721. It relates the fortunes and misfortunes of the eponymous heroine, detailing her exploits from birth until old age.

MOLL FLANDERS

2B This novel by Sebastian Faulks was published in 1999. The story is based on the exploits of the Special Operations Executive's female agents who worked in the French Resistance. It was made into a film in 2001 and starred Cate Blanchett in the title role.

CHARLOTTE GRAY

3A This novel by Vladimir Nabokov was first published in Paris in 1955 and in London in 1959. The novel is noted for its controversial subject. The 37/38 year old protagonist and unreliable narrator is obsessed with the 12 year old Dolores. The book's title is the private nickname that he gives to her.

LOLITA

3B This Jane Austen novel first published in 1815 is a book of youthful hubris and the perils of misconstrued romance. Before she began writing this novel Austen said 'I'm going to take a heroine whom no one but myself will much like.' In the very first sentence she describes her heroine as handsome, clever and rich.

EMMA

4A This novel by Neville Shute was first published in 1950. It was adapted for film in 1956 and starred Virginia McKenna and Peter Finch.

A TOWN LIKE ALICE

4B This novel by R D Blackmore was first published in 1869. It is a romance based on a group of historical characters based in the 17th Century in Devon and Somerset, particularly the East Lyn Valley area of Exmoor. In 2003 it was listed on the BBC's survey The Big Read.

LORNA DOONE

SPARE This novel subtitled *Memoirs of a Woman of Pleasure* by John Cleland was first published in 1749. From her position of wealth and happy respectability our heroine looks back at her early life. Arriving in London alone poor and innocent she falls into the hands of a brothel-keeper. It is only when she is separated from the man that she loves that she enrolls in the unhappy profession of prostitution. By the age of 18 she can afford to retire. In her marriage she can at last combine passion with romantic love.
