Rnd 1: At No. 8: - Doctor Zhivago - 1965 (\$2.07 billion)

Doctor Zhivago is a 1965 epic romantic drama film and is based on the 1957 novel of the same name. It is set in Russia during the first quarter of the 20th Century.
