**Lancashire towns' and cities' coats of arms**

1a	<b>Picture B</b> The coat of arms itself contains a variety of clues to this town. It is one of two unitary authorities in Lancashire.	<b>BLACKPOOL</b>
1b	<b>Picture I</b> The motto translates as 'The rock will remain and the river will flow', the river being the Ribble. The purple lions are taken from the arms of the de Lacy family who granted the town its Charter and there is another significant clue to the town's identity on the coat of arms.	<b>CLITHEROE</b>
2a	<b>Picture A</b> Three bees in flight, the bee being the emblem of perseverance and industry in keeping with the town's motto of 'Arte et Labore' (through skill and hard work). The black wavy line represents the river Blakewater on the banks of which the town was built.	<b>BLACKBURN</b>
2b	<b>Picture H</b> The galley provides a clue to this town which is believed to be the location of the lost Roman port of Portus Setantorium. The town boasts three lighthouses and was the first planned Victorian town.	<b>FLEETWOOD</b>
3a	<b>Picture D</b> The motto was originally Beware but was changed in 1988 to Be Aware for this Lancashire market town whose wealth came primarily from the cotton industry. It is home to the largest Mormon temple in Europe.	<b>CHORLEY</b>
3b	<b>Picture G</b> The united roses (red but with a white centre) were adopted to denote that a large portion of this town's population migrated here from Yorkshire. The boat refers to the old fishing industry,	<b>MORECAMBE</b>
4a	<b>Picture F</b> On this coat of arms, the wheatsheaf alludes to the agriculture of the area, the battlements represent Greenhalgh Castle and the wavy lines, the River Wyre.	<b>GARSTANG</b>
4b	<b>Picture C</b> The lamb is the Lamb of St Wilfred, the town's patron saint and the letters PP are not what many would like it to be but 'Princeps Pacis' or Prince of Peace.	<b>PRESTON</b>
Spare	<b>Picture E</b> The shuttle represents cotton spinning, and the cylinders and calico the industry of printing that material. The oak branch is allusive to the name: it is bent into the shape of its initial letter and the acorns recall the old form of the name, Akerenton.	<b>ACCRINGTON</b>
Spare	<b>Picture J</b> Another coat of arms with the lions of the de Lacy family, this time supporting a the Stork of the Starkie family also prominent in the area. The stork stands on a hill surrounded by cotton plants. The motto 'Hold to the Truth' derives from the Towneleys.	<b>BURNLEY</b>

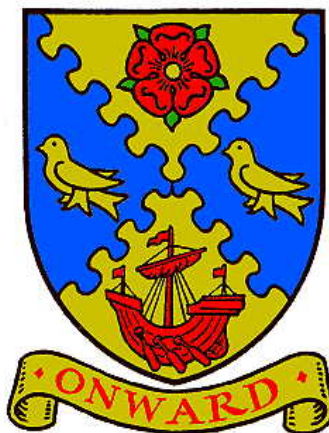
