1a: EH1 2NG – A gun is fired here every day (except Sundays, Good Friday and Christmas Day) at 1pm. The firing dates from 1861. **Ans: Edinburgh Castle**

1b: SE10 8XJ – Normally each day at 1pm, a bright red time ball is dropped. First used in1833, it is one of the world's earliest public time signals. **Ans:** <u>Greenwich Observatory</u>

2a: TR19 7AA - Headland and holiday complex. The Longships Lighthouse is situated close by.

Ans: Land's End

2b: DD1 4EZ – Officially opened by Prince William and Catherine on 29th January 2019. RSS Discovery is moored close by. **Ans: V&A Dundee**

3a: NP16 6SE - Founded on 9 May 1131 by Walter de Clare, Lord of Chepstow. It is situated on the

banks of the River Wye and was only the second Cistercian foundation in Britain.

Ans: Tintern Abbey

3b: LL48 6ER - Tourist village designed and built by Sir Clough Williams-Ellis between 1925 and 1975.

Ans: Portmerion

4a: FK1 4RS – Opened by Queen Elizabeth II on 24 May 2002, as part of her Golden Jubilee celebrations.

A piece of revolutionary engineering built to replace a flight of 11 locks that were removed in 1933.

Ans: Falkirk Wheel

4b: BN1 1EE – Former Royal residence, used as a hospital in World War I. Comprises Gothic, Chinese,

and Indo-Saracenic architecture styles.

Ans: Royal Pavilion (accept Brighton Pavilion)

LL44 2YH – Massive medieval structure built on top of a spur of rock, which initially was close to the sea. Lancastrian stronghold during the Wars of the Roses. **Ans: Harlech Castle**
